More importantly, I learned that God will do the heavy lifting by providing the answers our care receivers need. My job will be to help the care receiver become open to the guidance that God provides. In other words, God will heal the pain. 

The Pilgrimage ministry grew out of the request of members of the congregation to offer something for adults like the confirmation experience for our youth. 



The Library Corner: The Library Corner: Heaven

"Today you will be with me in paradise" Jesus told the thief who was beside him, hanging on a cross on Golgotha. The thief knew his own guilt, and recognizing that Jesus had something he wanted to be part of, he had asked Jesus to "remember me when vou come into vour kingdom."


Adam Hamilton discusses these words of Jesus in his study Final Words from the Cross. The main point is that the thief, and hopefully we too, will be with Jesus. But we wonder about paradise - heaven - what is that like? In a brief interesting discussion, Hamilton draws a parallel between paradise and Eden, and notes that the word for paradise can be traced back to a Persian word for the "king's garden." What a wonderful possibility—to be, by God's mercy, in God's garden.

Other authors have written about heaven, some from Bible research, and others from what they assert are their personal experience of death or near death and then coming back to life. Here are several of those books in the church library:

Heaven, by Randy Alcorn. Alcorn has spent years researching what the Bible has to tell us about heaven, which gives a theological background to what he has to say, while also giving his answers to many questions that people have, such as "will our pets go to heaven?"


90 Minutes in Heaven: a True Story of Death and Life, by Don Piper with Cecil Murphey. Piper is an ordained minister who was in a deadly car accident. He says he was pronounced dead at the scene, but 90 minutes later a Baptist minister arrived on the scene and prayed over him, and he revived. He gives an account of his experience in heaven, and also the very difficult time he had recovering.

To Heaven and Back: A Doctor's Account of her Death, Heaven, and Angels, and Life Again, by Mary C. Neal, MD. Neal, an orthopaedic surgeon, gives a straightforward summary of her life, her developing relationship with God, and then about a kayaking trip in South America where a freak accident keeps



her and her kayak under water for many minutes. During that time she describes the distinct sense of being held by Jesus, and the sight of spiritual beings that appear to escort her to heaven. She experiences a kind of life review, in which she says "... I was able to see clearly that every decision, every human interaction impacts the bigger world in far more significant ways than we could ever be capable of appreciating." (p. 57)



Join the discussion on : *The Boys in the* Boat: Nine Americans and Their Epic Quest for Gold at the 1936 Berlin Olympics

Daniel James Brown's robust book tells the story of the University of Washington's 1936 eight-oar crew and their epic quest for an Olympic gold medal, a team that transformed the sport and grabbed the attention of millions of Americans. The sons of loggers, shipyard workers, and farmers, the boys defeated elite rivals first from eastern and British universities and finally the German crew rowing for Adolf Hitler in the Olympic games in Berlin, 1936.



The emotional heart of the story lies with one rower, Joe Rantz, a teenager without family or prospects, who rows not for glory, but to regain his shattered self-regard and to find a place he can call home. The crew is assembled by an enigmatic coach and mentored by a visionary, eccentric British boat builder, but it is their trust in each other that makes them a victorious team. They remind the country of what can be done when everyone quite literally pulls together – a perfect melding of commitment, determination, and optimism.

Drawing on the boys' own diaries and journals, their photos and memories of a once-in-a-lifetime shared dream, The Boys in the *Boat* is an irresistible story about beating the odds and finding hope in the most desperate of times – the improbable, intimate story of nine working-class boys from the American west who, in the depths of the Great Depression, showed the world what true grit really meant.

The Book for May is In His Steps by Charles M. Sheldon





The launch of weekly worship is here! The summer of 2016 was filled with making plans, the fall and winter of 2016 brought the beginnings of Agape House, and now the spring is here and we will be witness to a new congregation at DeUMC being formed. Thank you for your prayers, your service and your financial gifts. In whatever ways you have contributed to this project, it has helped to get us where we are.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE CHILDREN'S HOME?

Spero Family Services, formerly the United Methodist Children's Home in Mt. Vernon, IL, is proud and honored to announce that we will assume ownership and management of the Illinois Masonic Children's Home in Murphysboro as of April 1, 2017. The Masons have pledged to honor their financial commitment to the residents that are currently at the home in Murphysboro. The 15 youth residents were grateful to know that they will remain at the home, and that

the 15 home staff will also remain. This allows the kids to remain in the care of people they already know and trust. Initially, very little will change at the Murphysboro site, but



eventually we would like to introduce some of the same programs offered through the Mount Vernon facility. Our Mt. Vernon site has provided residential homes and treatment for youth and young adults ages 12-21 since 1921, and houses up to 36 youth today.

The former UMCH changed its name to Spero Family Services as of April 1, 2017, and the Murphysboro site will be called 'Spero Youth Homes'. Our name change came after much prayer and deliberation of our board, and hope that the new name will convey more clearly that Spero is not simply an orphanage anymore. We now offer a vast array of programs and services to our local communities in Southern Illinois - such as Spero Counseling and Wellness Center, a Family Foundations program, a Foster Parent program, a Nurse-Family partnership program to help firsttime mothers, a YouthBuild program offering GED and certifications to youth, and more!

Our organization continues to grow as God allows, and also because of the tremendous support we receive from our donors, local business, and the United Methodist family. It's those strong faith foundations and rich history with the UM family which gives us a wonderful opportunity to share God's love with those we serve on a daily basis when able. We are grateful for the United Methodist support and commitment to our organization over the past 104 years and look forward to keeping that connection for years to come.

Again, we are proud to be part of the Murphysboro community, and will now be offering hope, help, and healing to the youth living in the Murphysboro home – our newest member of the growing Spero family!
