After months and months of planning, meeting, discussing and dreaming, the Envisioning Committee put before the congregation, in a meeting, options to move forward with a new phase of improvements to our church facility, focusing on our aging Education Wing. This next phase of improvements will actually be done in two parts, as defined by a congregational vote on the project. The first phase will consist of new heating and AC, window upgrades for greater energy efficiency, additional insulation, a nursery upgrade and remodel, a new fire suppression hood for the kitchen range and a full remodel of the bathroom in the fellowship hall to make it fully handicap accessible. This first part is estimated to cost approximately \$122,000. The next part will be a complete remodel of the upstairs restrooms in the Education building, making them both fully handicap accessible and fully modern with new fixtures and accessories, at a cost of approximately \$135,000.

I say "part one" and "part two" because the congregational vote divided this project into two two-year financial campaigns. The first deals with several essential improvements, and the second is a much-needed facility upgrade that completes the work of installing the elevator to make our church more accessible to those with mobility challenges.

Over the next several weeks we will begin the work on part one, both in terms of actual construction and in our capital campaign efforts. Each of you will receive an invitation to an informational meeting about the proposal. In the meeting, an opportunity will be provided for you to consider your financial commitment to this much-needed work.

As we all know, the easy part of this work is voting yes for it, and even finding the actual contractors to do the work in not real hard. The most challenging part for most of us is making that financial commitment to do our part. Fortunately this congregation has an excellent track record when it comes to that part. This total project is just slightly more expensive than our elevator project. We paid that loan off in full in the three years we committed to do so, and have enjoyed it immensely. What a blessing it has been.

Well it time to step up again. Our theme is "Let's finish what we have begun." Let's do this final stage and make our building more modern, more appealing, and most important, fully functional for our mobility-challenged population. We can do this together just like you have all done so many times before.




A.M. Yoga



Library Corner: State of the Library

This month is the seventh anniversary of the UMC Library! Seven years ago a new library began its life in Room 110. It built upon and replaced a library that had functioned years ago but which had long since been out of service. We wanted a living library to serve the needs of the congregation as a source of inspiration, knowledge, entertainment, and food for thought. It's a mission we continue to pursue!

There have been lots of changes over the last seven years—many new books and other materials have been purchased or donated, and the library is a comfortable place to browse the shelves, find books of interest, and sit and read awhile.

Here's the "State of the Library" by the numbers:

1,875: The number of items the library holds at this moment—books, DVDs, and even some CDs.

184: Current number of library patrons. Some have taken out one or two items, and some have taken out many. It doesn't matter what number of items you borrow— if the library has the one book you need, that is success!

106: The number of books in our "Christian Life" section. We also have a "Women's Christian Life" section (**42** books) and "Men's Christian Life" (**14**) Oops, sorry men! Does someone have suggestions for some new books?

11: Number of times our most popular items have been checked out. The two most popular are: Unbroken: a World War II Story of Survival, Resilience and Redemption by Laura Hillenbrand, and a book for youth-The Brick Bible, a New Spin on the Old Testament.

10: That would be the number of times our next most popular items have been checked out: The Brick Bible, a New Spin on the Story of Jesus, and a fiction book A Light to my Path (Refiner's Fire Series) by Lynn Austin.



Many: That would be many thanks to all who help support the library and who have expressed appreciation for it!






