

mission project as part of our Advent activity. The Service and Missions team would like to provide you some historical information about the project and to answer a few frequently asked questions about participation.


The Spirit of Christmas is an annual project of The Carbondale Interfaith Council. It brings together communities of all faiths in an effort to help the needlest in our own backyards. Over the years, the project has benefitted The Women's Center, Migrant Workers, Senior Adult Services, Community Alternative, Rehab & Care Center of Jackson County, Oak Grove, Helia Health Care, Rebound, Good Samaritan, SIRSS, Adolescent Health Center, Archway I and II, and Gillespie Temple.

Beginning Sunday, November 5th, Gaye Auxier will have names/lists available for you to select. The names are fictitious to maintain anonymity and will have been edited for age-appropriateness. *The lists may include numerous items, but you are not required to buy all of the items on the list.* Perhaps you will choose to purchase one fairly expensive item or choose to purchase several less expensive items. Use your own judgment. A Sunday school class or a study group may decide to choose a few names/lists to fulfill as a class or group. Please return your wrapped gifts to the church no later than Sunday, December 3rd, in the large bag you are given when you select your name/list. Gaye and her helpers will transport all the gifts to the distribution center at Grace United Methodist Church's auditorium.

You may opt to contribute a donation to The Carbondale Interfaith Council, designated for *The Spirit of Christmas*, rather than choosing a name and shopping for that person. Make checks payable to The Carbondale Interfaith Council and Gaye will deliver them to the project coordinator. The Council has volunteers to do last-minute shopping for any names/lists that were not taken

The Library Corner: Seeing the Other Side

Even the most empathetic of us have a hard time imagining what it is like to live a life utterly different than our own. If we are blessed with a well-stocked refrigerator, it's hard to feel what it's like to suffer real hunger. If we have not been homeless, who can quite imagine what it would be like? Or to struggle with deep poverty? What might happen to a poor African-American boy in the Deep South in the 50s? We have a knowledge gap that is hard to bridge—but there are resources to help us enter those experiences. Here are some in the church library:

same kind of different as me: a modern day slave, an international art dealer, and the unlikely woman who bound them together. In this fascinating true story we meet Ron Hall, a success oriented art dealer, and his wife Debbie, whose passion is to know God. They meet Denver, a homeless man so badly damaged by life that he is suspicious of everyone, at a mission where they volunteer. Debbie sees something in Denver that no-one else can, and is determined to break through his shell. What happens after that is a totally unexpected life changer for all of them. This is now a movie—you might want to read the book first!

Under the Overpass: A Journey of Faith on the Streets of America by Mike Yankowski. Mike had money. He had food. He was going to college. But he also had faith in Jesus Christ— and he wondered if he was just mouthing his faith? Could he live it? He decided, along with his friend Sam, to live for 5 months like the homeless live. They wanted to find out about the homeless, they hoped to encourage others to "live out loud" for Christ, and they wanted to depend on Christ for their daily needs. It was quite an experience and is quite a story. The question and answer session at the end is also enlightening. Read his response to the question: "Don't most homeless people *choose* to be homeless?"

When Helping Hurts: How to Alleviate Poverty Without Hurting the Poor and Yourself, by Steve Corbbett and Brian Fikkert. It's a big, big question—what to do, and how to do it in projects to help the poor. The authors take a very Biblical perspective and a very practical perspective in discussing what helps—and what hurts, and why. It takes planning, and one necessity is to help people use their own assets- not primarily money, but their knowledge of their own community, and their talents and abilities—to work out solutions.

Among the many points the authors make: "... poor individuals and communities are highly complex and not well understood by [others]... People living in North American ghettos, in slums in Mexico City, and in rural India really do know a lot things... that outsiders will never understand. It is simply foolish to ignore their insights." This is essential reading for people who want to address problems of poverty in communities.

You will find these books and others on the upstairs or downstairs library tables.

And later in the month you will see a wide variety of books related to **Thanksgiving and Christmas**—because the holidays are coming!
