ere are many things, which happen in the life of our church, which not everyone knows about. Some of these things are very routine and ordinary while others are quite special but just do not touch a large population. Recently our church was involved in reaching out to a special group of people in this low key way and I was privileged to be a part of that effort.

Several youth in our church lost a close friend through circumstances that appeared to have been a suicide. He was a teammate on their summer football team, someone they ran with; worked out with; hurt and sweated with; won and lost with. Suddenly he was gone with no warning, no time to prepare, and no explanation why; just gone. His death left a hole where a person use to be and many unanswered questions for everyone effected by his loss.

As the plans for his services began to take shape some of the parents and coaches wanted a place where the team could meet and just be together. They wanted a place where they could gather in order to pay their respects to the family as a team and then spend some time just being with each other.

Members of our congregation offered our church as that place of gathering. We then offered to provide a meal after the team returned from the visitation for all the team and their families so that they could continue to be together and support each other. That Sunday evening we feed about 70 people, transported

some of them in one of our church vans, and provided profession-counseling services for any who wanted to partake.

We asked nothing from them; just the opportunity to serve in a time of crisis and need. As I looked around the fellowship hall that evening I had no idea who most of those people were and may not even see many of them again. But I am confident for one evening they felt the hospitality and support of Christian community. I think it is exactly what Jesus would have done and I for one felt honored to play a very small role in helping it happen.







Can We Ever Be Grateful Enough?

If we are talking about Christ dying on the cross for us—for you and me, and indeed for the whole wide world, the answer is . . . no. We can never quite grasp it all, never quite understand it all, never hold it all in our minds and hearts.

But all the more, especially at this time of year, we should be thinking of Jesus- of his life and of his death, and of his resurrection into a new life. What do we know of him? What do we understand of him and of his sacrifice, given with immeasurable love to the world?

Here are a few books from the library that can help you focus your mind and heart on Jesus:

The Jesus I Never Knew by Phillip Yancey. Those of you who have read anything by Yancey, editor of the "Christianity Today" magazine, know that he writes with thoughtfulness and depth. The description of this book notes that Yancey writes about Jesus as a "complex character who generates questions as well as answers; a disturbing and exhilarating Jesus who

wants to radically transform your life and stretch your faith."

Jesus: the Greatest Life of All by Charles Swindoll. This is the ninth volume of Swindoll's series on Great Lives from the Bible. He writes of Jesus as child, rabbi, "substitute" (for us all), and King.

Case for Christ: A Journalist's Personal Investigation of the Evidence for Jesus by Lee Strobel. In this widely read book Strobel asks tough guestions about the life of Jesus and gets answers from credible sources in his own journey from un-belief to belief.



Resurrection COUNTDOWN

Make this interactive craft to use as Easter approaches.

What you need:

- An empty egg carton
- Scissors
- Tissue paper (a dark color)
- Pencil
- Bible
- 12 slips of white paper
- Glue
- Marker

What you do:

- 1. Cut the lid and side flaps off the egg carton.
- 2. Lay the carton open-side down on tissue paper. Trace and cut out the rectangular shape.
- 3. On the paper slips, write 12 verses from John 12 about Holy Week (including one about Easter).
- 4. Place each slip in an egg cup, in order, starting at the top left and ending (with the Easter verse) at the bottom right.
- 5. Put glue around cups and carton edges. Lay the tissue paper on top.
- 6. Gently mark numbers 1-6 on the tissue paper along the top row and 7-12 along the bottom.
- 7. Before Easter, punch through one cup each day and read the verse.

What's tiny and Yellow and can take you DOWN?...... POLLEN......

Yes it is that time again. We in beautiful Southern Illinois know that pollen can be a health problem to us and our children. What can we do? How can we help those we care about that are suffering.

Each spring, summer, and fall, trees, weeds and grasses release tiny pollen grains into the air. Some of the pollen ends up in your nose and throat. This can trigger a type of allergy called hay fever. Symptoms can include:

- Sneezing, often with a runny or clogged nose
- Coughing and postnasal drip
- Itching eyes, nose and throat
- Dark circles under the eyes

Taking medicines, using nasal sprays and rinsing out your nose can relieve symptoms. Allergy shots can help make you less sensitive to pollen and provide long lasting relief. Drink plenty of fluids. Hot showers can relieve stuffy noses. Unlike a clod, pollen allergies will stick around as long as the pollen does.

Common sense can make your life easier also. Do not sleep with the windows open. (Have you seen the pollen on your car in the morning?) If you hang clothes outside, finish them up in the dryer to remove pollen spores that sticks to the moist surface. Leave the flowers in the yard. Enjoy them safely through your window. Happy Spring.

Fine time for Feinstein Donation

It is time for the annual Feinstein Foundation food and dollar drive campaign. Every year the Feinstein Foundation, which is based in Rhode Island, donates \$1 million dollars to community food banks as part of a partial match for every dollar raised and pound of food donated between now and April 30th. The collection point for food items at our church is at the collection box at the top of the stairs in the education wing. All monetary donations can be by individual check mailed directly to the Murphysboro Food Pantry or made out to the church designated for the pantry. The *Noisy Collection in March* was designated for the pantry so we are off to a good start!

The latest statistics provided by Feeding America for Jackson County reports that 10,490 or 17.9 % of the population fall into the hungry category or who are now called the "food insecure population." This past year the Murphysboro Food Pantry served close to 30,000 persons. Recipients can pick up food boxes once a month so the 30,000 served are duplicated numbers. We serve 12 Jackson County cities and towns.

We thank the United Methodist Congregation for not only their continued financial and donated food support but also for all the volunteers who take their turn working at the pantry and serving on the board.
