Praying Out Loud Workshop Thursdays, June 7—21 6-8 p.m. Led by Pastor Larry







HEALTHY SKIN IS ALWAYS IN



Heavenly Sunshine, Heavenly Sunshine. Many of you remember this short song that we sang in our childhood. We took chances that we (and our mothers) didn't realize were dangerous. We played, worked, and slept in the sun.

I now have many friends that have skin cancer issues that they are dealing with due to the over exposure of the sun. The American Cancer Society gives us advice to help protect our families and us from harmful rays.

Remember Slip, Slop, Slap.

- *Slip on a shirt: Cover up with protective clothing to guard as much skin as possible when you are out in the sun. Choose comfortable clothes made of tightly woven fabrics that you cannot see through when held up to a light.
- *Slop on sunscreen: Use sunscreen and lip balm with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher. Apply a generous amount of sunscreen (about a palmful) and reapply every 2 hours and after swimming, toweling dry, or sweating. Use sunscreen even on hazy or overcast days.
- *Slap on a hat: Cover your head with a wide-brimmed hat, shading your face, ears, and neck.

 If you choose a baseball cap, remember to protect your ears and neck with sunscreen.

Skin cancer can be found early, and both doctors and patients play important roles in finding skin cancer. If you have any of the following symptoms, tell your doctor.

- *Any change on your skin, especially in the size or color of a mole, growth, or spot, or a new growth (even if it has no color)
- *Scaliness, oozing, bleeding, or change in the appearance of a bump or nodule
- *The spread of pigmentation (color) beyond its border, such as dark coloring that spreads past the edge of a mole or mark
- *A change in sensation, such as itchiness, tenderness, or pain

Take care of each other and enjoy the Heavenly Sunshine safely.

We're getting there...

The church's renovation loan has gone from \$633,439 starting in 2006 to \$265,761 as of April 30, 2012. The recent debt elimination campaign started in June, 2010 has helped considerably and will reduce the debt to about \$224,000 by June, 2013 when the campaign pledges end. What will it take to get us to a zero balance by June, 2017? It would take \$4,794 a month beginning this June. Our current monthly loan payment is \$3,758 so this would mean we need to increase the required payment by about \$1,000 per month to wipe out the debt in 5 years by June, 2017. Is this possible?

Our most recent loan history would indicate, "Yes, we can!" For the year 2010, the average payment was \$7,605. In 2011, the average payment was \$5,866. As of April, 2012 we have averaged \$5,674 a month. So, a payment of \$4,794 is very possible. If we averaged \$5,092 a month we could reduce the debt to zero by June, 2016, just four years from now! Enough numbers for now.

Planning for church upgrades and completing repairs are necessary as the church grows in missions and members. It won't be long until the Board of Trustees and Finance Committee begin working on the 2013 budget. Please keep in mind what the church family means to you and to the community.


Lynn Pierson and Sharon Graff, led the Nurture Committee in its May meeting.

Here is a partial list of our new library additions:

"When Helping Hurts: How to Alleviate Poverty Without Hurting the Poor. . . and Yourself" Sometimes we want to help—but how to get a handle on the best things to do? This book offers concrete ways to look at poverty related issues for an "effective and holistic ministry to the poor."

"The Joy of Listening to God: Hearing the Many Ways God Speaks to Us" by Joyce Hugget. We talk to God—but are we list ening to him? Joyce found out she wasn't. She was pouring out her troubles before him, certainly a good thing, but she was missing that whole dimension of being quiet before God, and hearing him. She gives some practical guidance for us on our own walk with God.

You are invited to keep checking out the library table in the upstairs hall and also the library downstairs. You will find these and other good books featured each week. Happy reading to you!



Carl graduated in May from S.I.U. and has accepted a job with the theater at the Carlisle Inn in Sugar Creek, Ohio. His first production, The Confession based on the Beverly Lewis novel, begins June 6th, so no summer vacation this year. Hyun Ji is also headed to Ohio to the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, a very prestigious school. We wish these two talented, young people the very best. They will be greatly missed by this congregation. Sounds like we need a road trip to Ohio!!!

You may think you're making the environmentally responsible choice when you request paper instead of plastic bags in the supermarket. But you would be wrong. "Paper is not a good alternative because it has a higher carbon footprint. That means it takes more energy to manufacture the product and transport it and recycle it," said Joan Barenfanger of the Green Business Network of Springfield. She oversees the network's Better Bag Project, which seeks to increase the use of reusable shopping bags in Springfield. "We don't use the term 'cloth bags' because a lot of them are actually made from plastic," she said. A recent study of shoppers at large retail stores in Springfield revealed that more than 90 percent of them use plastic or paper shopping bags and fewer than 10 percent opt for reusable bags. Of shoppers who use paper or plastic, 95 percent use plastic. The study was done by the Green Business Network with help from the recycling staff at City Water, Light & Power. It takes 12 million barrels of oil to make a year's worth of plastic bags – 100 billion – for Americans, according to the National Cooperative Grocers Association. The production of plastic bags releases toxins into the environment and the bags don't break down in landfills, the grocers association reported. In addition, plastic bags threaten marine animals, which can become strangled in them. Sea animals also can starve when they eat plastic. Scientists recently reported finding plastic in the guts of small fish. These fish are eaten by larger fish, which are then eaten by humans. Paper bags don't harm animals, but their manufacturing produces 70 percent more air pollutants and 50 times more water pollutants than plastic bags. And nearly twice as much energy is required to recycle a pound of paper instead of a pound of plastic, according to the Green Business Network. Governments are dealing with the eco-threat of both paper and plastic bags by enacting bans and fees. San Francisco bans plastic bags and requires shoppers to pay 10 cents for paper bags. Westport, Conn., bans plastic bags. Los Angeles is moving forward with a plan to ban both types of bags in supermarket checkout lanes. In Austin, Texas, a bag ban will begin next year. "I have never liked seeing everybody in grocery stores with plastic shopping bags. One day I decided I had to do something," said Barenfanger, who educates

the public about bag problems by speaking to community groups. She shops with reusable bags, but also reuses plastic bags. "I bring them back into the store and display them on my shopping cart. Maybe I can guilt people a little," she said. The Better Bag Project wants retail stores to encourage shoppers to choose reusable bags. For example, clerks can be trained to ask, "Did you bring your own bags?" Stores can have reusable bag promotions that include punch cards, discounts and freebies. Retailers also can switch to more expensive compostable bags, which are biodegradable. (More suggestions can be found at http://gbns.org/Projects/BetterBagProject.aspx.) To remind shoppers not to leave reusable bags in their cars, Schnucks at Montvale Junction has a large sign on its building that asks, "Did you remember your reusable bags?" Food Fantasies on Wabash Avenue donates a nickel to local charities each time a shopper either declines a bag, brings in a reusable bag or uses a box from the store. It's dubbed the Nickel Bag Project. Although Barenfanger educates people about bags whenever she gets the chance, she said she sees little change in Springfield's bag habits. "What breaks my heart is seeing a mother or father with a child in a shopping cart with 10 plastic bags," she said. "The child is learning that's OK."
