Killing Jesus: A Reader Review by Gaye Auxier

Killing Jesus, an exploration of Jesus' life, times, and death was number one on the New York Times bestseller list for a number of weeks. Gaye Auxier reviews this book for us.

Name of the Book: Killing Jesus, A History

Authors: Bill O'Reilly & Martin Dugard

What is this book about? The life of Jesus, within the context of (then) current events.

What makes this book interesting or meaningful?

Reading this book was somewhat like watching the movie TITANIC. I already knew what the ending was going to be. The interest lies in reading the unfolding of the story. O'Reilly & Dugard tell the story of Jesus' life and influence within the context of what was going on in the world at the time. Many serious scholars have done this in great detail (and the "Sources" list at the end of the book is impressive), but O'Reilly & Dugard condense that body of work into a readable, interesting, chronological story. Keeping explanatory notes to a minimum, the authors create a narrative flow that one doesn't often find in scholarly material. Familiar Bible passages often are paraphrased as conversations, which also aids in creating interest and readability.

Any other thoughts about the theme of the book or what makes this book stand out?

I found the historic present tense annoying, and had to get used to reading it. "Mary and Joseph step through the Temple gate...Jesus clenches a coiled whip...Pontius Pilate sits tall...," etc. [Emphasis mine.] Also, reading the gory details about Herod's ailments and how they affected his various body parts only served to prompt me to think, "TMI," rather than to enhance my understanding of the time period.

Would you recommend it to others? Yes.

Why? If you are interested in reading a credible account of Jesus' life in the context of history, without getting bogged down in minute details and theories, I would recommend this book.

How many stars (from 1 to 5) would you give it? 3.5 * * *

THE LITTLE RED "MISSION" BUCKETS Mission work is very important in the life of our church. Each month we donate money to a worthy cause through our Noisy Offering. In the past the money has been collected by a few of our children and the ushers during the Hymn of Praise.



Beginning in October we are introducing a new method for collecting this money. A little red bucket will be located at the end of every pew on Sunday morning. At an appointed time, the congregation will be prompted to pass the red "mission" bucket down the pew. We are trying to find a time to pass the buckets that is less intrusive in the service i.e., not during the hymn of praise or during our quiet, centering time. Then as the children come forward for the Children's Sermon, they will pick up the buckets at the end of each pew and bring them to the front where they will pour them (with help) into a large Money for Missions jar. We will leave the money in the jar each week and watch it grow until the end of the month. The kids will still get to help and be active participants in this mission, and the money in the jar will be a very visual example by watching it grow.

At the end of the month, we will empty the jar and start all over again. There may be a few bugs in this system, but we will work those out as needed. After all, we are <u>Method</u>ists, so we can always find the right method of achieving our end result. The Worship Team
