FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

I spent a part of this last month in physical therapy due to lower back pain, which was frustrating for me because I have been going to the gym regularly for over a year to just strengthen my body and improve my overall health. Of course one of the first things they noted was that my lower back muscles were weak, which frustrated me even more. However they showed me a whole serious of exercises to do and surprisingly enough most of them I was not doing at the gym. I was working hard and was strengthening many muscles but I was also neglected some important ones and so my overall health was not what I wanted or needed it to be.

Physical health is never about doing just one thing but it is about doing several things in harmony with each other. While one improvement of any kind will impact the whole system for good, exercising with no regard for diet or sufficient rest will not achieve the overall good health one might desire.

I discover this same dynamic in my spiritual life as well. Practicing one or two spiritual disciplines, like going to church and attending Sunday School, is always a positive step but it will only take us so far. Bit by bit we must add to our regimen in order to reach an increased level of spiritual growth and wholeness.

For many Christians, one step is accepting the influence of God in regard to the financial decisions of our lives. This step involves much more than just what I give or do not give on Sunday but directs how I dispose of the remaining part of my financial resources. Allowing God to influence what I buy, what I save, what I invest is a huge step in our spiritual growth and one that few of us take all at once.

As we approach our annual stewardship campaign I just invite you to consider the role God plays in your financial decisions. God is ready to provide amazing counsel and wisdom in this area if we are ready to take his advice. It is so important to remember God does not need or want our financial resources; God wants our hearts, all of our hearts, and for most of us a part of our heart is focused on money.

In this month of the Blessing of the Animals event it is time to remember the special place that animals have in our lives, and in the life of the world. We think especially of the pets that live with us. In many ways these animals make us more human, more content, more playful and happier!

In the Church library you will find books and DVDs that spin dramatic, touching stories about pets and their people. Look for these and others in the library and upstairs on the library table:



What would a library be without a library cat? Or, failing that, at least a book about a library cat! Well, we have the book, and it is **Dewey: The Small-Town Library Cat Who Touched the World.** This is a true story of a cruelly abandoned kitten who is found in a library drop box, and in return for saving its life, gives back over and over again to the library, the staff, library patrons, and as his fame spreads, to the world. His example of tenacity, intelligence and legendary friendliness, made a difference in many lives.

Seabiscuit: An American Legend by Laura Hillenbrand is not a just a great (and true) horse story, it is a great story, period. The tale of this ungainly and unpromising horse is intermingled with the stories of the people who loved him and worked with him. The time is the latter half of the depression, and ultimately this horse with heart becomes a cultural inspiration and legend.

Blind Hope: An Unwanted Dog And the Woman She Rescued by Kim Meeder and Laurie Sacher. A lot of real life rescue goes on in this book. Kim and her husband rescue a ravaged piece of ground and begin a ranch to rescue horses, which later also becomes a youth ranch to help children in need. Laurie comes to the ranch to work with children and finds a place there along with her blind rescue dog, which in turn helps Laurie's aching heart heal.

Lessons From a Sheep Dog by Phillip Keller tells the story of Phillip and his border collie, Lass. He applies his lessons as Lass's trainer and companion to his relationship with God, in this small and interesting book.

We have DVDs also. Animals and people combine to make good movies! We have:

- the enjoyable family movie "Because of Winn-Dixie"
- the exciting story of **White Fang**, an adaptation of the novel by Jack London, which features thrilling adventures in the beauty of the Rocky Mountains
- a terrier and a young boy star in The Adventures of Greyfriars Bobby, which is based on a true story. Their adventures help change a community!
