

For some it might offer an opportunity to seriously rethink this area of your life and consider a new course. For all of us it will offer an option to consider our generosity and how we express our thanks to God in the stewardship of our lives and resources.



Worship should be a place a person can come once a week and feel welcomed, loved, accepted and safe, but over the last several months we have had a number of experiences which threaten that environment. Numerous times persons have been approached on our parking lot and even in our church building by individuals who are asking for financial assistance. On several occasions when assistance was not given, these persons making the requests have become increasing hostile and abusive in their manner and language.

In a recent conversation at our Murphysboro Ministerial Alliance meeting, I learned that every church in town now deals with this uncomfortable and awkward situation. In our Trustee meeting in September, we spent a good deal of time discussing this concern and the Trustees passed a number of measures to attempt to provide for the overall comfort and safety of our congregation. These measures are listed below.

#### Beginning the second Sunday of October:


Only the southeast **doors at the corner of 15<sup>th</sup> & Pine streets and the west doors off the parking lot will be opened on Sunday morning**. These doors will be opened at 8am. If you need access to the building earlier and do not have a key, please contact the office during the week and arrangements will be made.

When worship begins, all exterior doors to the church will be locked. The west door off the parking lot will be monitored at all times and opened to allow persons into the building. Signs will be placed on all other external doors notifying persons how to enter the building.

The parking lots will be monitored at all times on Sunday morning and other times when the congregation gathers. If you are ever approached by someone requesting assistance, please report them to an usher immediately and do not give them money - this only increases the problem. Our church provides thousands of dollars of assistance to the needy of our community every year through a variety of channels. Virtually all the individuals who are coming to our community churches on Sunday morning are not persons of genuine need. The vast majority are untruthful about their circumstances and should not be helped.


Obviously these extra duties will place an additional burden on our already busy usher crews. If you would like to assist in this work as a volunteer, please contact the church office, Rob Williams, or Ron Moutardier. We could use several additional volunteers to help secure our building and grounds.

No one regrets the need for these steps more than me. As I sat in recent meetings, I could not help but think of our African American brothers and sisters who over the years from time to time have had to secure their places of worship due to threats of racial violence. And like them, we will not be deterred from our



freedom to worship and will take whatever steps are prudent and necessary to assure all who gather to worship with us are safe and secure. We have learned many times that freedoms are a precious and sometimes costly privilege to maintain. Larry


### Other Additions to the Library




## *The Underground Railroad* by Colson Whitehead

#### **OUR NEIGHBOR'S TABLE**

This month marks the fourth anniversary of the Our Neighbor's Table Ministry. Our Neighbor's Table began to be discussed at MUMC as an outreach from a study group led by Teresa Gilbert and Trina Eaton, regarding the Good Samaritan and who are our neighbors. Other folks in the congregation participated in similar programs in other areas. These two groups came together and decided to step out on the trail and reach out to our neighbors. After receiving permission from the church council, we got start-up money from Walmart and SIH. We began by offering what was called Meal and a Movie on the last Sunday of the month. Our rationale was that many families are short of



money and groceries at the end of the month and kids don't receive school lunch or breakfast on Saturday or Sunday.

It soon became apparent that family movies were not a need in Murphysboro but food still was. So now we call our mission Our Neighbor's Table. Presently we serve between 40-75 people each month. Many return every month and some come to church services occasionally. They consist of families and single individuals. There have been occasions when our group and our church has been able to reach out and help neighbors through difficult situations.

Our church family has supported this outreach with their prayers, their service and their dollars for which we are very grateful. Many people of our church faithfully help with cooking, serving and providing delicious desserts every month. The hope for the future is to continue to serve our community and do a larger part to fight physical and spiritual hunger. Jesus taught us to love our neighbor and to feed His sheep. We pray that we can feed members of our community both physically and spiritually. All are invited to join us in the fellowship hall the last Sunday of the month for food and fellowship.

"Marthas" are needed to serve food and "Marys" are needed to provide fellowship. Currently, we are also seeking someone interested in cooking the meals on a rotating basis. It is a simple menu.
