



From the Pastor's Desk

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As my retirement draws near I find myself reflecting on the past and the future. Not only my time as a Pastor in Church and then my move to a retiree, but also on the past and future of the United Methodist Church. I am also often asked about my opinion regarding what might happen now! So let me take just a minute to give you some of my thoughts about what is currently the state of our denomination and some possible outcomes for its future.

Following the 2019 General Conference and the vote taken to strengthen the current stance of the Discipline on matters of sexual orientation, several things have happened. It is my understanding that at least one Jurisdiction (which is a large group of the Conferences covering several states) in the Northwest United States has denounced the General Conference decision and said it will not abide by the vote. There have also, been several other Conferences across the United States that have followed suit. As well as various individual churches and pastors that have made public announcements that they will not abide by the Discipline on matters of sexual orientation and will perform same-sex marriages if asked. I have also read that currently over 300 gay or lesbian pastors are currently ordained and under appointment in the United Methodist Church. Some of these live with same-sex partners and some do not.

It seems obvious to me by these items that our denomination is already split in practice and we no longer have a Discipline that applies to everyone. The General Conference is no longer the voice and decision-making body for our entire denomination. Groups across the church are meeting to discuss just how to make this split a more formal reality in the hope of bringing some degree of order and grace to this process.

The next General Conference is in 2020 and whatever happens between now and then I am confident that the United Methodist Church will not look the same in the future. I believe that we will have in the United States at least two branches: one more progressive and open, one more conservative and less accepting of same-sex practices. I feel it is likely in the future that Annual Conferences, individual churches, clergy, and individual UM members will need to select a branch of the church to affiliate with.

In the past Churches at all levels and denominations have split and reunited on a regular basis so this is nothing new. But it is new to us and an uncertain future is always an apprehensive future. Just as my new job status will be new to me and a new pastor here will be new to each of you. That does not mean that it will be a bad change. God is not done with us or the United Methodist Church and I am confident our church will continue to fulfill its mission of making disciples to transform our world.

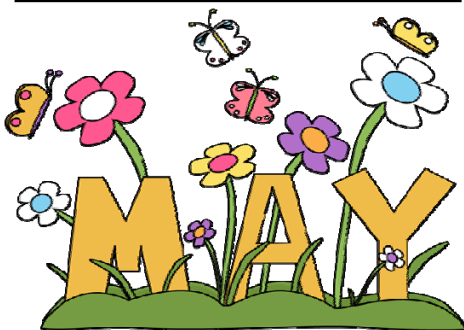

PRELIMINARY 2019 FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our church Finance Committee has passed the 2019 operating budget. It is through a combination of the congregation's giving pledges, non-pledge giving projections and numerous annual fundraising programs that we are able to carry out the many missions of our church. Just a sampling of these missions and associated expenses: camping experiences and mission trips for youth; Young at Heart programs; support of numerous community programs such as the Food Pantry and Neighbor's Table; confirmation classes and youth activities that enrich the lives of many of our youth; financial support for building and equipment; and appropriate staffing to carry out the church's overall mission.

While all of the above has occurred, there are some issues that have developed. The first draft of the 2019 budget reflected a significant deficit of \$57,300. To achieve a "balance" the Finance Committee decided to only pay \$8,000 of the apportionments of some \$56,000. We have met this expense at 100% for years. Any additional payment of the apportionments as the year goes by depends on giving. The rationale for deciding not to pay a higher percentage of apportionments was mainly because pledged giving and non-pledge projected giving are down \$38,500 for 2019.

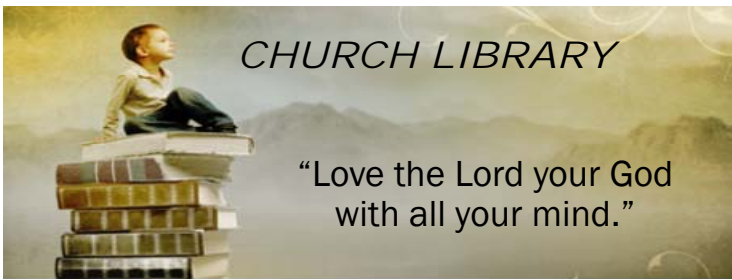
Separate from the MUMC budget, the budget for the successful Agape House in DeSoto will lose the conference financial support this year. Agape House will continue with cash carryover from 2018 and possible grant income. The future of Agape House is something the church leaders will be addressing this year.

One other fact to consider is that with a budget of \$411,000 it takes, on an average, **\$1,126 a day to keep the church operating**. This doesn't include putting any funds away for contingencies.

What does this all mean? Not sure, but the congregation should be aware that if we want to continue to be a thriving church and not diminish the progress of the past dozen years, it will mean we all need to consider where we are with our stewardship. Yes, the church leadership will be doing their share by looking at all personnel and program expenses when setting the annual budget for 2020.

The Library Corner:

Something for (Almost) Everyone

So many books and so little time! For those looking for “just the right book”, here are a few of the newer books available through the church library:

For Moms: **The Velveteen Mommy** by Jean Doucette. Yes, this title refers to the classic children’s book *The Velveteen Rabbit!* In that story the child’s toy rabbit becomes Real—but not until a child really loves him, a journey that involves both joy and pain. Doucette loves this story and uses it as she discusses becoming a parent. With faith, humor and a light touch Doucette tells about her journey into motherhood, and says: *“My hope is that amidst the daily ups and downs of motherhood, when your hair is being rubbed off and you feel like a slightly shabby rendition of your former self, you will realize that a child loves you and that means you’re Real—a Real Velveteen Mommy. (p. 16)*

Inspirational: **I’ve Been Thinking . . . Reflections, Prayers, and Meditations for a Meaningful Life.** Shriver has been thinking, and she wants us to do the same. She discusses a variety of topics in a number of short chapters, using situations in her own life, plus quotations and prayers. It is all designed to help readers determine what is meaningful for them in their own lives.

For history buffs: **Black Jack Logan: An Extraordinary Life in Peace and War**, by Gary Ecelbarger. A native of Jackson County, John Logan grew up to be a congressman who defended slavery, but then grew more—and fought for the rights of African Americans as he took up arms in the Civil War, becoming a prominent General. He became well known nationally, and if he had not unexpectedly died, might have become a President of the United States.

World War II history: **Irena’s Children: A True Story of Courage**, by Tilar J. Mazzeo. Irena Sendler has been called “the female Oskar Schindler.” With courage and inventiveness, she managed to smuggle 2,500 Jewish children out of the Warsaw ghetto and place them with families on the outside.

Historical Fiction: **Varina**, by Charles Frazier, author of *Cold Mountain*. This is Varina Davis, the wife of Jefferson Davis. He was a widower much older than she when she married him at age 18, She could not possibly imagine that her husband would become the “president” of the Confederacy, nor of the turmoil and sorrow that would follow. It is telling that after his death she moved to a northern state—New York.

For children: **Baby Wren and the Great Gift** Sally Lloyd-Jones. Baby Wren, so new to this enchanting world, wishes she could dive like a kingfisher, or soar like an eagle, or swim like a sunfish. But when she is filled with gratitude at the beauty of the world, she discovers her own special gift.

Here’s hoping you find just the right book in the church library—whether it is one of these, or one of the many others available.

France, 1939

In the quiet village of Carriveau, Vianne Mauriac says goodbye to her husband, Antoine, as he heads for the Front. She doesn’t believe that the Nazis will invade France...but invade they do, in droves of marching soldiers, in caravans of trucks and tanks, in planes that fill the skies and drop bombs upon the innocent. When France is overrun, Vianne is forced to take an enemy into her house, and suddenly her every move is watched; her life and her child’s life is at constant risk.

Without food or money or hope, as danger escalates around her, she must make one terrible choice after another.

Vianne’s sister, Isabelle, is a rebellious eighteen-year-old girl, searching for purpose with all the reckless passion of youth.

While thousands of Parisians march into the unknown terrors of war, she meets the compelling and mysterious

Gäetan, a partisan who believes the French can fight the Nazis from within France, and she falls in love as only the young can...completely. When he betrays her, Isabelle races headlong into danger and joins the Resistance, never looking back or giving a thought to the real--and deadly--consequences.

WHAT ARE THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES UP TO?

Faithful Friends, is a class for women of all ages with rotating leaders. During the month of May, Mary Ann Chambers Hinchcliff will be leading the class as they continue their video based study -- *Twelve More Women of the Bible* -- with life changing stories for women today based on teachings from Karen Ehman, Lisa Harper, Margaret Feinberg, Biana Juarez Olt-hoff, Chrystal Evans Hurst, and Courtney Joseph.

Helping Hands, led by Donna Horniacek, is a traditional Bible Study Class for men and women. The Spring 2019 theme is Discipleship and Mission. The first unit – Call to Discipleship – offers four lessons and highlights several aspects of what it means to be called by Jesus as a disciple. The five lessons in the second unit -- Call to Ministry – explore the diverse ways in which Jesus' disciples were challenged to exercise their call to ministry. The third unit – The Spread of the Gospel – contains four lessons beginning with Paul's introduction of himself to the Jewish and Gentile Christians living in Rome.

Passages, led by Randy Auxier, meets in Room 110 (the Church library). In this class participants delve into in-depth studies of theological themes in Christianity. The class will be on hiatus from April 14 thru July 7 while Randy is in Poland.

Pathfinders, led by Michelle Parker-Clark, will be returning to Mayberry during the month of May with Volume 3 of the video based Mayberry Bible Study. The four part series will cover the following episodes and discussion topics: 1) High Noon in Mayberry (Courage), 2) Barney's First Car (Folly), 3) A Wife for Andy (Gossip), and 4) The Great Filling Station Robbery (Discernment).

Seekers, led by Susan Patterson, will begin a new DVD study -- *The Call: The Life, Ministry, and Message of the Apostle Paul*. Through author, Adam Hamilton, follow the journeys of Paul, beginning with his dramatic conversion, as he spread the Gospel through modern-day Greece and Turkey. Travel to the early church sites and explore Paul's conversations with the Romans, Corinthians, Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Thessalonians. In this six-week study, you are invited to experience faith through Christ's greatest teacher and missionary.

Trailblazers, a class for young adults, focuses on studies about fitting Christ into the big picture.

HEALTHY HABITS

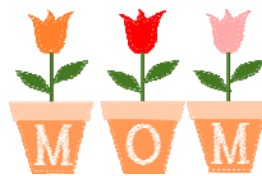
