She gently replied, "I would say what is on your heart for them to know and become." It was exactly what I was thinking. So, here it is...:



Your Finance Committee is pleased to provide a 2021 Financial Snapshot.

Looking at 2021 MUMC Income which exceeded estimates by \$84,706 (27.9%), gifts and other income came in at \$388,359. Drilling down into income, let's first acknowledge those who pledged resources totaling \$185,280 in 2021. Actual dollars received came in at \$181,796, or 98.12% of pledges made—awesome job, pledgers! However, the stellar

giving group in 2021 turns out to be those who gave generously but did not pledge. Actual dollars received came in at \$144,670, or \$29,797 over our income estimates. The majority of dollars received over income estimates arrived in the form of a second Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan in the amount of \$43,630.

Giving over and above operations, both monetarily and non-monetarily, deserves mention. Special offerings at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas, for departing staff and Pastor Appreciation, and holiday flowers amounted to just under another \$10,000. Your non-monetary giving above operations was inspiring last year. Yard sale donations, school supplies and gift cards, candy for children and families events, food donations to funeral dinners and Our Neighbor's Table, blankets for the local warming center, blood donations, items for the Kentucky and Tennessee tornado victims, and many other donations are a testament to this church family reaching out to the unchurched and the sick, hurting and broken—all of whom need to experience the love of Jesus (as we all do).

Looking next at 2021 MUMC Expenses which fell short of estimates by \$45,104 (12.56%), spending came in at

\$314,113. It would serve little purpose to itemize all 13 expenses divisions when all but two underspent. It makes more sense to share the top four expenses divisions that underspent (-) and the two that overspent (+). =

develop the full MUMC financial picture. Deducting expenses at \$314,113 from income at \$388,359, our net income picture becomes \$74,246. So we've had a good year, church family. We would be negligent, however, if we failed to point out that PPP loans are in our rear view, and expenses are definitely going up in 2022 if we wish to make disciples. As Christians, we are called by His name. Let us continue to faithfully honor Him by supporting His church with our presence, prayers, witness, service and gifts. God bless and keep you safe!



The Library Corner: The Good, the Bad, and the Helpful

A Bit of Bad News: We didn't plan it, but the library is basically closed for the time being. The downstairs bathroom work has necessitated closing off part of the hall, which includes the library room. We hope the library will again be available by the end of February.

In addition, for a variety of reasons the church library team has not been able to meet regularly. We regret to say that most of the regular work of the library-- including getting new books on the shelves and available to readers --has halted. We hope that situation too will improve!

But Here is Good News: Pastor Marty has been encouraging church members to read the Bible regularly, and with attention. This is something most of us mean to do, but may find difficult. Maybe a plan would be helpful? The library will offer a drawing for two different types of "Daily" Bibles in February. These Bibles are meant to be used to read the Bible in a year! Can you do it? Look for more information on this drawing early in February.

Something You Can Do: Please keep the Little Free Library (LFL) in mind. For those of you who may not know, the LFL is a small book box on posts which is placed close to the sidewalk and our pavilion on the 16th street side of the church.

The LFL is an easy-to-use book exchange box that brings a variety of reading materials to the community. People are encouraged not only to take a book or books from the box, but also to leave a book or two they think other people would enjoy.

The Personal Librarian

A remarkable novel about J. P. Morgan's personal librarian, Belle da Costa Greene, the Black American woman who was forced to hide her true identity and pass as white in order to leave a lasting legacy that enriched our nation, from New York Times bestselling authors Marie Benedict and Victoria Christopher Murray.

In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating for critical works as she helps create a world-class collection.


But Belle has a secret, one she must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a well-known advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American.

The Personal Librarian tells the story of an extraordinary woman, famous for her intellect, style, and wit, and shares the lengths she must go to—for the protection of her family and her legacy—to preserve her carefully crafted white identity in the racist world in which she lives.

The MUMC Choir is Back



December 10, 2021 is a date that our friends and neighbors in states south or Murphysboro will never forget. The tornadoes destroyed lives and property in Kentucky and Tennessee.

Contacts were made by Rick Pierson to deliver items to Mayfield, KY the following week. Our church family was asked to donate essential items that Rick planned to haul to KY in his horse trailer. By Sunday evening the donations were so great that a larger trailer was needed. Roger Twenhafel donated an enclosed 40 ft trailer and a truck to pull it. Monday morning, 12/13 donations continued from throughout our community and work began to load this trailer. Service and Missions Committee approved a \$2,000 donation and pallets of water were loaded and some shopping was done (with help from Phoebe Heller and Lola Pierson) to purchase various sizes of socks, underwear, blankets and etc. Diapers, baby wipes, bath tissue, paper towels, kleenex and lots of toiletries were delivered and loaded. Rick Pierson met me at Rural King and he shopped for guy stuff: tarps, tying cords, butane tanks, chain saw supplies, flashlights and much more.

We met on the parking lot the night of 12/14 for a prayer service and blessings for those that would receive our donations. Early on Wednesday morning driver Rick Pierson, Roger Twenhafel and Michelle Parker-Clark journeyed to Mayfield KY with Richard Pierson, Pastor Marty McMichael and Charlie Pierson in our truck with gas cans to fill and give away in Mayfield. Before they left Murhysboro, PLP Battery provided First Responder Helmet batteries for Richard to also distribute.

Dresden, TN was needing donations and a second 40ft enclosed trailer and truck were donated by Marty McNitt. This trailer was loaded on Wednesday and Thursday 12/16 Marty McNitt and Dick Graff journeyed to Dresden with Jim Hughes and Jay Graff in Jay's truck. Tyler Doody, Logan and Phoebe Heller, Charlie and Lola Pierson and lots of men and women worked tirelessly in getting all the items sorted and loaded. Donations continues to arrive and were well received. A couple of little bikes were loaded on the trailer and two small children were delighted. I'm sure the coats, clothing and blankets have been appreciated this last month.

We were asked to sponsor some Christmas gifts for families housed in Dawson Springs, KY and again our church family responded!! 12/21 Sharon, Jay and Nikki Graff and I had a great time sorting and wrapping those gifts. On 12/22 Marty and Dolores McNitt and Richard and I delivered the gifts to a lovely wooded setting in the state park that housed many families.

There were many monetary donations given and enabled us to provide lots of towels, washcloths, and plastic storage tubs and other items that were needed.

What a whirlwind of activity for those two weeks. I look back on all of this and am truly amazed at the outpouring of love I witnessed during those busy days.
