FREEDOM AND LIBERTY ARE CHARACHTERISTICS OF OUR FAITH

The month of July is mostly known for that great American Holiday, Independence Day. July has for more than 200 year represented the celebration of freedom and liberty. But what does it mean to be free and liberated? The answer to this question will garner different responses depending on the person engaged, their belief systems, various motives, and life experiences. Freedom as defined by the masses can mean anything, and in our time, it has manifested itself as everything. But freedom and liberty as defined in God's Word is not nebulous, it is clear. Freedom and liberty are not void of parameters. For when they possess no parameter a people become polarized, communities become unstable, and the corresponding nation begins to look like anarchy personified. The Word of God offers freedom and liberty with definite form, limits, and benefits.

Freedom is choice and it comes with a great responsibility for the well-being of oneself and the safety of others. Paul exhorts the church at Philippi to good works in his absence which constitutes a dynamic freedom; freedom *from* his apostolic direction and oversight to limit their behavior and freedom *in* the option given by God to freely choose daily what our actions will be... In that vein Paul defines Christian freedom:

² Wherefore, my beloved, as ye have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling. (Philippian 2:12) We understand that freedom is not the ability to do what we want, but a maturing which requires sound decision making based on an implied ethic and morality noted in this snippet of Paul's statement; "...work out your own salvation...". We learn that freedom must not be held freely, but with circumspection as it can both bless and curse. And if we want the blessing, our freedom must be bent toward that which is salvific; that is, our behavior must match that required by the God who saves...

Liberty is the condition of salvific freedom; or more clearly stated, Godly choices. Liberty is dependent upon the nature of your freedom. Paul writes to the church at Corinth with the idea of liberty in mind:

¹³ For whether we be beside ourselves, it is to God: or whether we be sober, it is for your cause. ¹⁴ For the love of Christ constrains us; because we thus judge, that if one died for all, then were all dead: ¹⁵ And that he died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves, but unto him which died for them, and rose again. (2 Corinthians 5:13-14)
Liberty is to live out and ethic and moral which transcends self and esteems others more than oneself; this is liberating, to see others live and to experience other living an ethic and moral which ensures that you can do the same. In this vein, we mutually experience true freedom and the perfect law of liberty.

The sad truth is that no nation is or has manifested this glorious mind of God. So, we need not waste our time condemning anything or anyone in this season of Independence. But instead, we may raise high the blood-stained banner of Jesus Christ which personifies the mind, moral and ethic of Christ for the healing of all nations. Christ is our banner, flag, and hope for the world. Amen!



The Library Corner: New Books and New Babies

A New Book:

One of the books added to the library this month is important for the church and its way of operating. The book is Mission Possible 3+: a simple structure for missional effectiveness.

If you are saying "huh?" give it a moment. The book describes how churches can gain greater effectiveness and direction—fewer meetings, with more meaning, and more accountability. This book will be on display on the upstairs bookcase, and another copy will be in the church library. Pick it up, look it over, and think about how our church can work with it. Also, check out our church website—you can look at information plus videos. Click on SAS (Simple, Accountable Structure).

Babies and Books:

In 2011 the Church Library Team decided to start a new book ministry—giving baby books from the United Methodist Church family to newborns and their parents. And what a joy it was! The first book we chose was a board book engagingly illustrated with a little bear cub and his parents and accompanied with the familiar words of "Jesus Loves Me" as the text. (Hint: you need to sing it to the baby as you look at the book together!) And for that second or third baby that comes along we now have several other fun board books we can give to baby and family.

By sometime in 2018 we had given away over 50 books! You probably have seen some of those books on the church altar over the years. And then in 2020 came the Great Interruption—otherwise known as Covid. For a while this ministry paused, but we are happy to report we are now in full operation. This year we have given books to seven babies and families to welcome them into this world—and that includes a little "catch up" for little ones who were born a year or more ago, and whom we missed. So far this year books have gone to:

Each book has the baby's name on a label inside the book. Books go to families who have connections to this church in one way or another—perhaps a parent who attends or attended here, or a grandparent or other relative who attends, and are announcing their joy in the new baby born to the family. And, by the way, we gave 5 books away in 2011, our first year of this project. Two of those children still attend this church: Lola Pierson and Liam Guthman!

Plainsong

A National Book Award finalist, this is a story of family and romance, tribulation and tenacity, set on the High Plains east of Denver.

In the small town of Holt, Colorado, a high school teacher is confronted with raising his two boys alone after their mother retreats-- first to the bedroom-then altogether. A teenage girl—her father long since disappeared, her mother unwilling to have her in the house—is pregnant, alone, with nowhere to go. And out in the country, two brothers, elderly bachelors, work the family homestead; the only world they've ever known. From these unsettled lives emerges a vision of life, and of the town and landscape that bind them together—their fates somehow overcoming the powerful circumstances of place and station, their confusion, curiosity, dignity and humor intact and resonant. As the milieu widens to embrace fully four generations, Kent Haruf displays an emotional and aesthetic authority to rival the past masters of a classic American tradition.
