## A TIME FOR REFLECTION AND ACTION

Lent is upon us. We are mindful of the season we are about to encounter, knowing that we've been here so many times before. But does repetition make for improvement? Having experienced countless Lenten seasons, are we experts? Not necessarily, sometimes familiarity can cause a diminished appreciation or respect for a thing. This outcome is just part of human nature. However, we can benefit from repetition if we are careful appreciate what we plan to undertake. Yes, we may need to take a moment to assess our preparedness for Lent. First, to carefully consider what it means. Next to be intentional in realizing an outcome consistent with it's virtues. And last but not least, living daily into a heightened reflective and sacrificial relationship with Christ.

<sup>22</sup> But be sure you live out the message and do not merely listen to it and, so deceive yourselves. <sup>23</sup> For if someone merely listens to the message and does not live it out, he is like someone who gazes at his own face in a mirror. <sup>24</sup> For he gazes at himself and then goes out and immediately forgets what sort of person he was. <sup>25</sup> But the one who peers into the perfect law of liberty and fixes his attention there and does not become a forgetful listener but one who lives it out, he will be blessed in what he does. (James 1:23-25)

### What Is Lent:

Historians generally agree that Lent emerged shortly after the Council of Nicea in 325 AD. The tradition was initially designed as a fasting and reflective period for new converts as a preparatory act for baptism. Although some aspects of Lent have changed over the centuries, it essentially has remained the same. It was and is practiced as a 40 period before Resurrection Sunday where people, through *fasting, prayer*, and *reflection,* consider the meaning of Resurrection Sunday. In essence, Lent is a personal inward search for the esoteric (*inner-meaning*) nature of Christ's sacrifice and subsequent resurrection. In the sense of an honest and intentional engagement of the means of grace to apprehend Resurrection Sunday, there is no one right way to engage Lent. It is and must remain a deeply personal journey for the faithful newly introduced to Christ and the seasoned saint, who is still in love with God and learning how to love others.

<sup>7</sup> Do not be deceived. God will not be made a fool. For a person will reap what he sows, <sup>8</sup> because the person who sows to his own flesh will reap corruption from the flesh, but the one who sows to the Spirit will reap eternal life from the Spirit. <sup>9</sup> So we must not grow weary in doing good, for in due time we will reap, if we do not give up. (Galatians 6:7-9)

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### A Virtuous Season:

It's easy to engage Lent based on what you have seen others do, but not necessarily edifying. For example, you may deny yourself a particular food you like for 40 days, decide on no television for 40 days, or pray a specific prayer for 40 days. None of these are wrong in themselves. However, to obtain real biblical virtue, some personal reflection on one's spiritual life; your strengths, weaknesses, doubts, questions, secret sin, love of God, deepest desires, and so on must all be laid bare before God and self. Then an assessment of what 'act(s)' could be engaged to improve, repair, strengthen, deepen understanding, or transform self to the virtuous form of a Christ. Lent is to have our eyes fixed on Jesus' cross and resurrection, but our hearts on becoming whatever that means. And that meaning can only be found through intentional and meaningful reflection with God and self which culminates into a commitment of action!

<sup>6</sup>Seek the Lord while he makes himself available; call to him while he is nearby! <sup>7</sup>The wicked need to abandon their lifestyle and sinful people their plans. They should return to the Lord, and he will show mercy to them, and to their God, for he will freely forgive them. (Isaiah 55:6-8)

#### Life After Lent:

Our life after Lent is our life in Christ. According to John 1 we are recipients of Christ's life which is reflected through us as light! Our life after Lent cannot be defined in any book or manual. It is too personal and intimate in its connection to your personal relationship with Christ. Life after Lent is what God has designed it to be for you! It is grace offered to you that you might become sanctified. It is time with God that you might grow in understanding. It is the presentation of self as a living sacrificial offering to God. So, start praying and thinking about the *thing* which needs attending in your life. Consider how Jesus' cross and resurrection might speak to that *thing* and what practice(s) may keep you mindful of Christ's mind it... In any mode of reflection and connection you choose always include prayer and reading of the Word.

12 Therefore I exhort you, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a sacrifice—alive, holy, and pleasing to God—which is your reasonable service. <sup>2</sup> Do not be conformed to this present world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, so that you may test and approve what is the will of God—what is good and well-pleasing and perfect. (Romans 12:1-2)





> **The Sport of Kings** By C.E. Morgan

The Sport of Kings is an American tale centered on a horse and two families: one white, a Southern dynasty whose forefathers were among the founders of Kentucky; the other African-American, the descendants of their slaves.

It is a dauntless narrative that stretches from the fields of the Virginia piedmont to the abundant pastures of the Bluegrass, and across the dark waters of the Ohio River; from the final shots of the Revolutionary War to the resounding clang of the starting bell at Churchill Downs. As C. F. Morgan unspeeds a fabric of shared histories, past and present



Downs. As C. E. Morgan unspools a fabric of shared histories, past and present converge in a Thoroughbred named Hellsmouth, heir to Secretariat and a contender for the Triple Crown. Newly confronted with one another in the quest for victory, the two families must face the consequences of their ambitions, as each is driven—and haunted—by the same, enduring question: How far away from your father can you run?

A sweeping narrative of wealth and poverty, racism and rage, *The Sport of Kings* is an unflinching portrait of lives cast in the shadow of slavery and a moral epic for our time.
